hen Ms. Biloholowksi first told me that I had to write an article for the "Senior Issue" of the Academy Torch, I thought I would just write a simple article about this year's biggest events/accomplishments, and maybe ask the administration what they thought about the year, this is where things got a little more complicated. I sent an email to Brother Frank, Mr. Fales, Mr. Nunan, Mr. Meehan, and Mrs. Szablewski asking them three questions:

How do you think this year went overall?
What three things do you consider the school's greatest achievements over this past academic year?
What words would you use to describe the class of 2018?

At the end of the email, I included a fourth point, asking them if they would like to comment on anything else, or elaborate on this recent school year or us, the class of 2018. The reason why this whole thing got a lot more complicated, is because all of the administrators had so much to say. I really wish I could include everything put everything every one of the administrators said, but that would go way over my word count, so I am going to summarize their main points, and put in as many direct quotes as I can.

When presented with the question of, "How do you think this year went overall?" everyone seemed to agree that it has been an amazing academic year, that really stood out at the Academy. No matter if it was in the classroom, on the field, on stage, or just walking throughout the halls, our administration was thoroughly impressed with how we carried ourselves and the accomplishments we achieved this year. For Mr. Meehan, "The student body really embraced the LaSallian goal of developing as whole persons. In my first year at The Academy it became clear to me that whether in the classroom, the theatre, the court or field, our students really give their all."

Continuing, this year was filled to the brim with accomplishments, so much so that, as Mr. Nunan puts it, "Our student body challenged themselves to push past what they thought themselves capable of, and the results were that they came through with exemplary achievements in academics, athletics, and the arts." When I initially asked the administration to name the top three accomplishments of this past year, almost every one of them responded with, "The are so many, it is not easy to single out three." ### CBA SPORTS ACCOMPLISHMENTS FROM LAST FOUR YEARS Aidan Broderick '18

he athletics program at Christian Brothers Academy is arguably the most prestigious in the state of New Jersey and ranks highly in the entire nation, winning state championships and competing against the best in the United States in every sport imaginable (except football of course). During my four years at CBA, our sports teams continued this tradition by bringing home bounteous amounts of trophies, similar to the amount of pizza Mr. Frake brings to every single S.A.D.D. meeting.

CBA XC has run at the Nike Cross Nationals, or NXN, for nine consecutive years, including their appearance during the 2017 season, with seniors Brian Hill and Ryan Miele leading the team to Portland. The cross country team won the Meet of Champions in 2014, 2015, and 2017, while the dual meet winning streak surpassed 350 consecutive victories this September and still lives on today.

The track team at CBA have been just as dominant as its cross country counterparts. Led by seniors Dan Mead (shotput) and Corey Palazzolo (high jump), the Colts won the indoor track program's 50th state championship this February; the team also won CBA's 23rd Shore Conference title just a few weeks beforehand behind an impressive performance by senior Andrew Canale.

CBA baseball's "Quadruple Crown": overall state group championship, Shore Conference Tournament title, county tournament championship and Shore Conference divisional title. The team was led by Luca Dalatri and Brandon Martorano, both of whom now play for the UNC Tar Heels. Luca was twice named Gatorade Player of the Year in New Jersey while playing for the Colts (2015 and 2016).

CBA swimming has won the state championship every year from 2010 to 2018 except for the 2017 season; this year, seniors Peter Warshaw, Connor Wright, and junior Paul Retterer led Coach Vito Chiaravilotti's team to the title. In the 2018 state championship, the "Aqua Colts" won nine of the eleven events at the competition, placing in second and third in the two events they were not victorious in.

Who could forget the CBA hockey team's overtime victory over Delbarton to take home the 2015 Non-Public State Championship? Chris Hayes' shot deflected off the glove of Dean DiFazio, a freshman at the time, and into the net to win the thrilling championship game. CBA appeared in the 2016 state championship to attempt to win a three-peat, having been named co-champions in 2014, but unfortunately Delbarton topped the Colts and got revenge for last season's defeat.

The CBA basketball team appeared in the Non-Public State Championship under the leadership of Pat Andree '16, the program's all-time leading scorer and current forward for the University of Lehigh Mountain Hawks. This season, seniors Robert Mahala, Nolan Madden, and JP Harvey led a youthful team to a 17-8 season that included a run to the Shore Conference Tournament semifinals.

CBA soccer appeared in three consecutive state championship games, falling to Delbarton in 2015, defeating Seton Hall Prep in 2016, and then losing again to the Green Wave in 2017.
