Different Roles

Primary Role: Student

- Drives the process
- Takes ownership over their college admission process
- Communicates with parents and counselor

Supportive Role: Parents

- Sets realistic goals/expectations
- Discusses costs/financial aid
- Facilitates conversations

Guiding Role: Counselor

- Develops partnership with student and parents
- Actively listens and shares information / feedback
- Serves as a sounding board

Admission Options

- Early Decision (I or II): 1st choice college, extremely competitive, binding
- Early Action: Applying typically by Nov. 1st and will hear by Jan. 1st, non-binding.
 - Restrictive Early Action
- Regular Decision: hear by April 1st
- Rolling Admission: apps reviewed as they are received, quick turnaround time

Early Decision

Early Action



Regular Decision

Apps typically due around Nov. Decisions sent out in Dec.

Apps due sometime in fall Decisions sent out Dec. - Feb. Apps due between Jan. 1 - Feb. 1 Decision dates vary



- An early acceptance letter means the stressful process is over sooner!
- Schools know your commitment, so your chances can be (slightly) increased.



○ CONS

- An acceptance is binding, and you must withdraw applications from other schools.
- · Beware of senioritis: don't let your grades slip just because you got in early!

DO THIS IF...

You have one dream school

- You'll get an early decision, but it's not binding
- You don't need to withdraw your other applications if you're accepted



 You still have to prepare your other applications, just in casethe Regular Decision deadline falls right after decisions are mailed out.

DO THIS IF...

You love one particular school, but still want to keep your options open



- Later deadlines mean you have longer to perfect your applications
- You aren't committed to any school, so it's perfect if you want to keep your options open



- A large, general applicant pool means stiff competition
- You won't receive a decision until later, so you'll be on pins and needles for longer!

DO THIS IF...

You like a lot of schools, and want to weigh all of your options

How Many Applications?

General guideline: Students should apply to 6-8 Colleges

- •1 -2 = Reach/Dream
- 3-4 = Target
- •1-2 = Likely (Admissions & Financial)

Application Types

Common Application


- www.commonapp.org
- Students have already created a common app account and completed certain sections during Junior College and Career Planning
- If a school uses Common App that is the preferred and easiest way to apply

Other Applications

- Coalition
- School Specific Applications
 - Only used when absolutely necessary- ex: Georgetown or Military Academies



Admission Review Puzzle Pieces



Who writes the Letters of Recommendation?

Type 1: Counselor

- Required
- Purpose: Floodlight
 - Context- The Whole Person
 - Academic, Personal, Community

Type 2: Teacher

- 2 Required
 - Students Choice
 - Preferably Junior Year
 - Class of Interest and/or Class they WORKED for
- Purpose: Spotlight
 - In Class
 - How did you contribute to class? What would the class have been like without you?

Type 3: Other

- NOT Required
- Additional recs (coach, mentor, boss, etc.) are the EXCEPTION because schools may not accept and may not add something significant to the picture

Should I Submit My Test Scores?

Test Optional Policy

- Student has ability to determine best path
- 1800+ colleges have adopted this policy
- Application review vs. Merit Scholarship review
- May be in student's best interest to apply test optional

Submitting Test Scores

- Test Scores are NOT on your transcript
- Submit OFFICIALLY
- Self-report



Niche Processes

Athletic Recruitment

- Division I or II must be cleared by NCAA clearinghouse
- Test scores
 - NOT required
 - If sending use clearinghouse code 9999
- Division III



Fine Arts

- Music, Art or Theater
- Audition could be required
 - part of admission and scholarship review
- Portfolio could be required
 - part of admission and scholarship review



Student vs. Counselor Responsibilities

•Student:

- Application
- Fee
- Essay including optional essays
- Request for CBA documents
- Submit Test Scores (if applicable)
- SRAR
- Financial Aid
- Checking status on college's portal

Counselor:

- Transcript
- Counselor Letter
- Teacher Letter(s)
- School Profile
- All documents will be submitted by application deadlines


Seniors must request documents in Maia at least 2 weeks ahead of their 1st deadline

Application Portal

Student can track their application checklist on each college's portal

Your checklist tells:

- Next steps
- What is received
- Missing pieces
- Admission Decision



Student can submit application before counselor submits supporting documents. These do not have to occur at the same time!

Admission Outcomes

COLLEGE ADMISSIONS PROCESS



Admission Review

The college's admission team reviews all necessary documents, discusses the student based on their admission criteria.

Accepted

The college notifies the student through the school's online admission portal, via email, or through a mailed letter. Some colleges release all decisions at the same time (UF & FSU), others as applications comes in.

Scholarship & Program Review

Because of a student's academic standing, they may ask the student to apply to specific programs (Honors, International, etc.) or for additional scholarships. There may be an essay or interview process.

Award Letter


After acceptance, the student will receive an award letter that details the provided financial aid package (including loans and grants), institutional scholarships, and some given state scholarships. The student may accept to deny any part of the award letter.

Decision Day

The student must provide their decision to their college by May 1st or sooner. Before deciding, it is important to visit the campus one more time, and talk to the financial aid office and program of interest to ensure the student's needs are being met.

Housing & Orientation

Once the spot is accepted, there will be some additional documents to provide to the college. Official transcripts should be sent from the high school and any acceleration program they used. He/she will also be selecting housing (if applicable) and an orientation time.



Denied


The college admission team decides the student's application does not meet their criteria so they deny admission. If a student feels this is a good fit, a student may seek alternative paths to the college, such as a transfer status.



If a student feels like there is additional information that should be reviewed, he/she may ask for an application review. Information to be provided may be a personal statement, recommendation letter, and school information.
