




Admission Options

Admission Plan	What does it mean?	Deadline	Answer By	Decide By
Early Action	Apply to colleges at an earlier deadline to get answers sooner Can be done at multiple colleges	October or November	December - February	May 1
Early Decision	Apply and if you get in you are committed to attending Can only be done at 1 school	November	December - February	ED is binding: If you get in, you go
Regular Decision	Traditional college application process	December - February	March - April	May 1
Rolling Admission	Applications are reviewed as they are received	July	6-8 weeks after applying	May 1

STANDARDIZED TESTS

The role of the SAT/ACT has changed significantly in college admissions over the recent years





<u>Understanding the PSAT</u>

The PSAT is scored on a scale of 320-1520

The score report will give the overall score and the score in each section

The Evidence Based Reading & Writing Section and Math Sections are both scored on a scale of 160-760

The score report will also show percentile rank. This indicates how a student's test score compares to others (nationally) who took the PSAT.

**Students should link their PSAT score to Khan Academy for free specifically tailored test preparation.

During JUNIOR year your son will have the opportunity to take an official in-school SAT.

<u>Test Optional Policies</u>

Test Optional Policies do not require students to send SAT or ACT Scores in order to be considered for admission.

Currently over 1800+ colleges are Test Optional

When is it s good idea to submit a standardized test score?

If the score is within or above the reported middle 50% of the previous applicant pool

Do colleges assume I have "bad" score if I don't submit?

No. Many colleges now have freshmen classes where up to 50% of admitted applicants did not submit scores.



The PSAT is now a digital assessment.

All students must download BLUEBOOK to their device in preparation for PSAT day.



Should I Submit My Test Scores?

Test Optional Policy

- Student has ability to determine best path
- 1800+ colleges have adopted this policy
- Application review vs. Merit Scholarship review
- May be in student's best interest to apply test optional

Submitting Test Scores

- Test Scores are NOT on your transcript
- Submit OFFICIALLY
- Self-report



Niche Processes

Athletic Recruitment

- Division I or II must be cleared by NCAA clearinghouse
- Test scores
 - NOT required
 - If sending use clearinghouse code 9999
- Division III




Fine Arts

- Music, Art or Theater
- Audition could be required
 - part of admission and scholarship review
- Portfolio could be required
 - part of admission and scholarship review

Supportive Role: Parents


- Sets realistic goals/expectations
